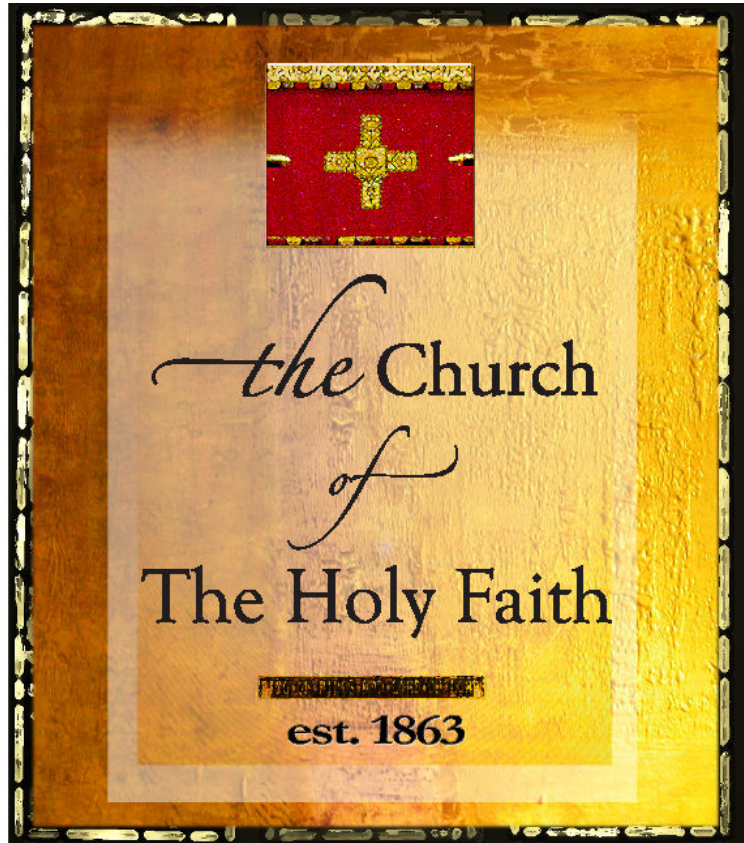

A message from the Rector

Dear Friends,

Stephen Hough, who writes for the Daily Telegraph in the U.K, recently visited Westminster Abbey and wrote about his experience:

The Church of England's evening service, adapted after the Reformation from the monastic hour of Vespers, is a wondrous phenomenon. Even the word 'Evensong' is poetic, and it seems to chime in perfect harmony with England's seasons: Autumn's melancholy, early evening light; the merry crackle of Winter frost; Spring's awakening, or the lazy, protracted sun strained through the warmed windows of a Summer afternoon.

Evensong hangs on the wall of English life like an old, familiar cloak passed through the generations. Rich with prayer and Scripture, it is nevertheless totally nonthreatening. It is a service into which all can stumble without censure – a rambling old house where everyone can find some corner to sit and think, to listen with half-attention, trailing a few absentminded fingers of faith or doubt in its passing stream.

Not only is the passage eloquent, it is an excellent description of this service, a service distinctive in the Anglican Communion, exclusive to *The Book of Common Prayer*, and prayed each evening throughout the worldwide Communion.

We are most fortunate at the Church of the Holy Faith to have a choir able to sing the beautiful settings of the canticles appointed for Evening Prayer: *The Magnificat* (from the Gospel of St.Luke,1:46-55), and the *Nunc dimittis* (Luke, 2:29-32). The text of the canticles was first set out in the sixteenth century and in that century and the centuries that have followed, music has been written. On Wednesday, February 1, we will celebrate Evensong on the Eve of the Presentation of Our Lord in the Temple. I do hope you will be able to attend. The service lasts approximately forty-five minutes and, though “rich with prayer and Scripture, it is nevertheless totally nonthreatening.” It is the perfect service to bring a friend or neighbor. Following the service, our Hospitality Committee, as always is their custom, will provide a lovely reception.

Our Muslim Neighbors

The fourth and last presentation by Imam Abdur Rauf, religious leader of the Taha Mosque of Santa Fe, is scheduled to be offered this Wednesday evening at 7:00 p.m. in Palen Hall. This week's presentation will focus on the modern scene of Islam. Imam Rauf will respond to such questions as,

"What are the reasons behind the violence and terror being experienced from militant Muslims?"

"How can there be such discrepancy between the purported peaceful teachings of Islam and hateful actions?"

"What can be done to help resolve the conflict between militant Muslims and the West?"

An additional Wednesday evening session without Imam Rauf is scheduled for February 15, at 7:00 p.m. Facilitated by Father Syedullah, this session will be a time of reflection and discussion of the series, comparison/contrast of Islam with Christian faith, and to consider in what ways the series has contributed to our Christian formation. Come to both, and bring a friend.

First Sunday for Children and Families

Lay Eucharistic Ministers Bring Joy to Residents

The Lay Eucharistic Ministers who lead the weekly Sunday Communion Services at the El Castillo Life Care facility truly bring joy and an abundance of God's Sacramental love to the residents at the retirement community. Each Sunday one of five people receive the Sacrament at the 8:30 a.m. Eucharist and carry it to El Castillo where they conduct a lovely service for about 12-15 residents and staff members. The residents are eagerly awaiting us each week as they gather around the table in the Nursing wing, a table which is already set with a clean, white linen cloth and the cross. After a warm welcome, an abbreviated service is conducted by a vested LEM, including the Collect and Gospel of the Day, a short meditation from the sermon of the morning, prayers and Confession, and the distribution of Holy Communion which was consecrated at the 8:30 am Eucharist at Holy Faith earlier that day. What a blessing it is for the residents who feel the care and love of their parish of Holy Faith even though they cannot attend services in person any longer. Many thanks to Alice McSweeney, Allen Mason, Grant Macdonald, Penelope Becker, and Bud McCollum who have faithfully carried out this ministry. We also welcome a new LEM, Ed Colson who will join the rotation in March.

Meet our Intern: Laurie Triplett

Hello. My name is Laurie Triplett. I have a Ph.D. in Mechanical Engineering from Carnegie Mellon University and have been employed as a scientist at Los Alamos National Laboratory for fifteen years. I am also a wife and a mother of two children ages 10 and 8. I have completed my Certificate in Anglican Theology through the Diocesan School for Ministry and Trinity School for Ministry (I shared six classes with Fr. Jim Gordon). I am currently applying for a Master of Divinity at Episcopal Divinity School. I began a

one-year Seminarian Internship at the Church of the Holy Faith on Oct. 1st (your feast of title. What a wonderful introduction to the church!).



Fr. Syedullah is my Internship Supervisor and Spiritual Director during this time and I am concentrating on Liturgy and Christian Education. Some of you may have heard that I may leave in May and those that are quick at math may realize that this is less than one year...Soon after I started at Holy Faith LANL offered me a 15 month change of station in Satellite Beach, Fl and I have accepted. However, the paperwork is taking a bit of a long journey before it is finalized. If it is finalized, my last day at Holy Faith will be April 29th. If for some reason it is not, I will remain until September.

My Spiritual Journey began rather abruptly one day twelve years ago as I visited Trinity on the Hill. "I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me." The words rang out from the priest's mouth as he began his sermon and they pierced my heart.

Moments before, I had been annoyed. I had come to church that day because a friend had asked me to come to his daughter's baptism. I did not believe in God but I believed in supporting my friends. Then those piercing words came. In that split second God had told me, "I am. I am who whispers in your ear that someone is in pain, the one you thought you could find in helping others. It is not they you should worship, but me." Since that day, I have been committed to proclaiming God (with words if necessary) "as I am going" to those who sense Him, but do not yet know His name. Several years after my conversion God asked me to fulfill this ministry as a bi-vocational/worker priest. I felt He was calling me to remain at my job yet to represent Him to people who go out of their way to avoid anything to do with God. I think one trusted mentor summed it up well, "Your path toward priesthood is a path that should gather up all the best and latest knowledge in science and in religion so that you may speak with gentleness and Spirit to people hungry to have their minds and souls brought closer to God."

My mission field is not only at work, but to my husband and children, to my neighbors, to my friends, to the waiters, waitresses, and cashiers at the local shops, and to anyone else I encounter as I go. I feel that God is not only calling me to proclaim Christ but to lead others in learning how to proclaim Christ to their co-workers, friends, neighbors, and all whom they encounter in this world. While much of my ministry to non-believers might take place outside the walls of the church, the church is integral to my ministry. Since my conversion the church has been part of the fabric of my life. Eucharist and worship feed and strengthen me. The community gives me a loving environment to grow in my relationship with the Trinity and a place to discern and use my spiritual gifts. The community provides me with practice in loving even those who are hard to love and to soften those aspects of my personality that are not so easy for others to love.

However, I have a confession. I was a little worried about coming to Holy Faith because it was "high church." I had some preconceptions that it would mean it was very formal, that everyone would be "cold and distant," and that I would be chastised if I didn't do everything exactly right. Well, my preconception could not have been more wrong. The church and the services have all been exceedingly warm and lovely. One of the most important things I think I will learn in this internship is that there are many "best" ways to encounter God and that I should not only not fear other communities that do it "differently," I should embrace them as a way to see God even more fully.

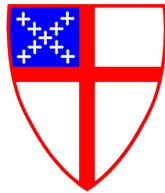
